Lent 2021


Dear Friend,

During this Lent where the shadows seem particularly deep, the best Catholic strategy is to shine confidently and calmly in the quiet spirit of our salvation, serving our families and neighbors with the peaceful determination of Our Lord. It is our duty as Christians and evangelists to show the love of Christ by going that extra mile and not giving up on anyone until we are given that wonderful sign of success, that heavenly promise—happiness.




Liturgy




Go for the Guilds Update
