Feast of St. John Bosco, 2023

Have you ever heard of Don Bosco's chestnut miracle?

As we begin a New Year together, this is the perfect time to remember St. John Bosco, whose feast day falls right at the beginning of a long stretch for us at Gregory the Great Academy. We often talk about Don Bosco as our patron in the light of his educational philosophy, but there is another and deeper aspect to the man that we look to for inspiration and guidance in our work of forming young men—bravery.

Don Bosco was never afraid to do good, even if he was faced with obstruction or opposition. This miracle of the chestnuts is a beautiful image for all that he did: fearlessly providing as God provided for him. God rewarded Don Bosco's bravery, whether with things as small as chestnuts or things as large as lodgings, teachers, or benefactors. Nothing is impossible to God through those brave enough to trust in His Providence. Don Bosco was content to expect that Heaven would provide even a miraculous supply of chestnuts if that was what he needed.

What more can we give these boys than the example and habit of bravery? Don Bosco once said, "The power of evil men lives on the cowardice of the good." If we are doing anything here at Gregory the Great Academy, I pray it is making brave good men—good men who are brave enough to know the true, do the good, and love the beautiful. What more can we give these boys and the world?

"You are surrounded by many boys who constantly watch you. Do your utmost to set them on the right path by good example, advice, and exhortation."

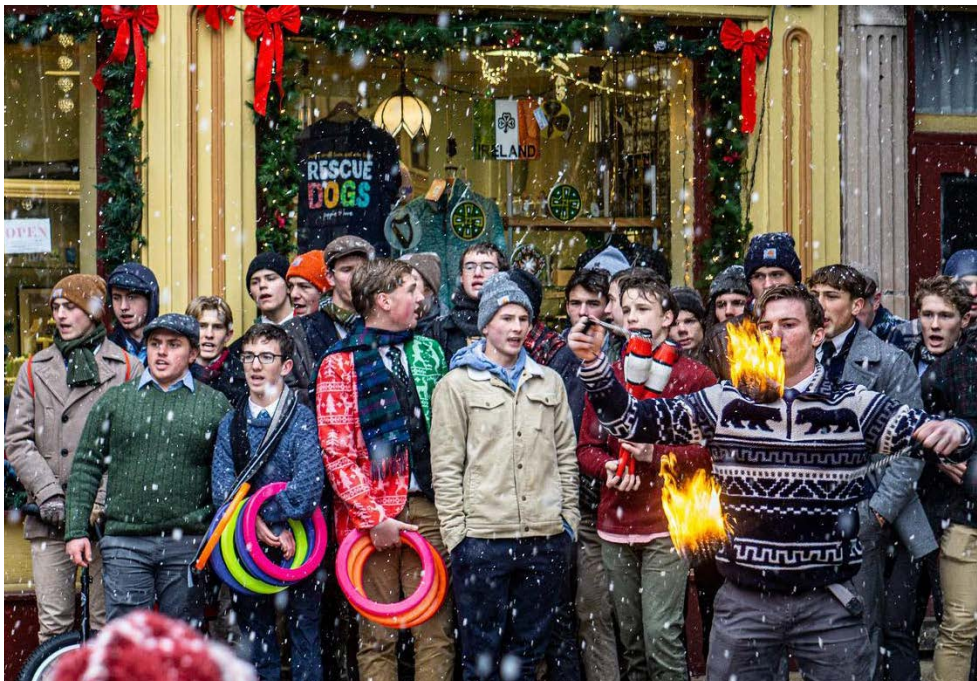
A Trip to Jim Thorpe
